Reprive investigates, litigates and educates, working on the frontline, to provide legal support to prisoners unable to pay for it themselves. The organisation promotes the rule of law around the world, securing each person's right to a fair trial and saving lives. Clive Stafford Smith is the founder of Reprive and has spent 25 years working on behalf of people facing the death penalty in the USA and now represents more than thirty five prisoners held in Guantánamo Bay.

Founded in 1985, the **Medical Foundation for the Care of Victims of Torture** provides care and rehabilitation to survivors of torture and other forms of organised violence. The main treatment centre is in London, with branches in Manchester, Newcastle and Glasgow. Two more are planned for the West Midlands and Yorkshire & Humberside. The MF offers medical consultation, examination and forensic documentation of injuries, psychological treatment and support, and practical help. Since its inception, more than 45,000 people have been referred. In 2007, the MF received nearly 2,000 requests for help for people from 95 countries, with large numbers from Iran, the Democratic Republic of Congo, Sri Lanka and Iraq.
